Petanque's history goes back to the Ancient Greeks as early as the 6th century BC. It is recorded they played a game tossing stone balls called spheristics. Then the Ancient Romans added a

Our April meeting continued our explorations of the South Auckland Volcanic Field including Mt Gabriel, Pukeiti and Otuataua Stonefields and the Ihumatao Fossil Forest. Mt Gabriel scoria cones have been quarried away but the tuff ring remains. The crater floor is an industrial site which includes the Villa Maria Winery. Pukeiti is a small scoria cone sited in the Otuataua Stonfields Historic Reserve. It and the neighbouring Otuataua volcano (now quarried away) produced the lava flows which were extensively farmed by the Maori and subsequent early European settlers. The Ihumatao Fossil Forest was an ancient kauri forest growing

in a peat swamp which was destroyed and buried by rising sea level. The remains can be seen in the aptly named mudflats. Next Meeting: 2nd Wednesday. Time & Venue: 2pm at Dave Allen's house. **VACANCY**
