BOOKS RECOMMENDED

A SELECTION of The Economist's pick of best books of 2018 (held over from the December newsletter):

Moneyland by Oliver Bullough. About how the super-rich conceal their wealth from the taxman with the aid of lawyers, accountants, lobbyists and friendly tax jurisdictions.

Fascism: A *Warning* by Madeleine Albright. A former US Secretary of State tells how countries can slide into tyranny. The virus is replicating.

Rise and Kill First: Secret History of Israel's Targeted Assassinations by Ronen Bergman. Need one say more?

AI Superpowers: China, Silicon Valley and the New World Order by Lee Kaifu. In artificial intelligence, think of data as the new oil and of China with its enormous generation of demographic data as the new Saudi Arabia.

Crashed: How a Decade of Financial Crises Changed the World by Adam Tooze. Survey of the wreck after the 2008 crash, seen in the rise of political extremism and fiscal austerity leading to popular uprisings.

Napoleon: A Life by Adam Zamoyski. Monster, demi-god or a mere mortal with virtues and flaws?

Churchill: Walking With Destiny by Andrew Roberts. Flawed and prone to making mistakes, but probably still has a claim to greatness as a wartime leader and a writer.

Gandhi: The Years That Changed the World 1914-1948 by Ramachandra Guha. Second volume of a massive project, opening in 1914 when Gandhi returns to India from South Africa.

Fryderyk Chopin: A Life and Times by Alan Walker. Man behind the myth and the sublime piano works.

Revolution Francaise: Emmanuel Macron and the Quest to Reinvent a Nation by Sophie Pedder. Rough-draft biography of an over-confident president caught in a crisis cycle.

The Spy and the Traitor: The Greatest Espionage Story of the Cold War by Ben Macintyre. A Soviet KGB spy who worked for the Americans, and the turncoat CIA agent who exposed him.

The Prodigal Tongue by Lynne Murphy. Comparing American and British English, free of prejudice and cant.

Beyond Weird by Philip Ball. The weirdness and logic of quantum mechanics and what it says about nature.

Rocket Men by Robert Kurson. About Apollo 8, the first manned flight to circle the moon. Remember that iconic picture of the blue Earth set against the dark void of space? It was taken from the spacecraft.

The 100 Best Novels in Translation by Boyd Tonkin. Great works of fiction translated into English.

Picasso and the Painting That Shocked the World by Miles Unger. About how the young Picasso started an artistic revolution in France.

The Golden Thread: How Fabric Changed History by Kassia St Clair. The role of fabric in world history, from Chinese silk to Viking sailcloth, Egyptian linen and more.

Dark Shadows: Inside the Secret World of Kazakhstan by Joanna Lillis. Country portrait by a reporter who traversed the huge country, an ex-Soviet republic, and spoke to oligarchs and rural folk, oilmen and herders.
