CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT SOUGHT

NOTICE of a constitutional amendment on the scheduling of the annual general meeting was given last month by David Dwerryhouse, who presided over the monthly meeting in the absence of President Margaret Nicholls. The constitution provides for the AGM to be held in April. The amending motion, to be tabled at this meeting, seeks to permit the AGM to be deferred for a month if circumstances warranted it. Half of paid-up members form a quorum and a two-thirds majority is required for the motion to pass. The motion:

After Clause 5.4, the following clause be added:


'5.5 The AGM may be deferred until the May monthly meeting if the committee considers that there is a compelling reason to do so. This provision applies from April 2019'


VICE-PRESIDENT, ANYONE?

WALKY-TALKY

WALKING in windy conditions as rain threatened, and learning nuggets of local history along the way: What could be more fun? Alan La Roche, walks convenor and Howick Historian, explained to the group of eight on their April 12 walk that the Nixon Hall area, from where they started out, was once swampland. Sale Street where the hall stands was named after a ship, the *Sir Robert Sale*, which arrived in Auckland in 1847 with a complement of retired Fencible soldiers and their families. They were then transported to Howick Beach. This event coincided with the calamitous Irish potato famine which led to an exodus of Irish emigrants to the New World. A small number came to Australasia. The walkers then swung by where Augusta Wallace had grown up. She was the first woman district court judge who also served on the Waitangi Tribunal for a long 18 years. Next up was Keppoch Lodge, residence of a Fencible captain. Mr La Roche, with his store of knowledge, kept up the commentary along Nun's Walk and down to Howick Beach. REPORT ON LAST MONTH'S TALK

BILL POTTER - THE AGES OF MAN

IT TOOK humour and some daring for last month's guest speaker, Bill Potter, to confront a U3A audience with the admonition that they will feel only as old as they think they are. An opening remark in his talk went like this: "It is a privilege to stand in front of a hot, young crowd." Subdued, scattered laughter. Those Howick members who are wise to the ways of the world and reasonably read in motivational psychology might have thought, "Oh please, not *that* corn again." Mr Potter acknowledged he had been told by his hosting committee the youngest member in the Howick U3A was 68 and there were not a few in their nineties.

Members had come to hear him, in all likelihood not to be persuaded of the old chestnut that age is what you make of it, but to ascertain how persuasive he could be in his assertion that age is mind over matter. (If you don't mind, it doesn't matter.) The trim Mr Potter was reasonable advertising for himself as he didn't look his years. Being good sports members engaged him in his parlour-game routine of playing feel-good games within their table groups. Some in the audience nodded in concert with his gags and throwaway lines.

This was above all an entertainment which most of the audience took in the spirit in which it was intended. Charm Mr Potter laid on in oodles with the practised ease of a public speaker who said he had given talks and presentations in 57 countries. Gosh, that number is close to one-third of the United Nations membership. He spoke ambiguously of encounters with the royals of Japan and Sweden; he had been in senior management in New Zealand and the United States; he has refereed in rugby at up to international level; and as a boy he was interned by the invading Japanese in Indonesia, where he was born. This person has been around. Delivery was well-oiled, facial cues timed perfectly.

A sampling of his attempted persuasions on the subject at hand:

"Do not live by the birth date in your passport, birth certificate or driver's licence – or you will really feel old-old."

"What's your inner age?," members were instructed to ask table-mates. Mr Potter gave his as 27. "You say you are marking the 50th anniversary of age 27 – and you'll never feel 77."

Who are the people perpetuating the notion that old is old?, he asked. After running off a string of ageism put-downers (some unprintable), he settled on one ("a burden to society") to make his point about being self-defeatist. "Yes", he said triumphantly, "it's not young people who are doing that old-is-old stuff, but oldsters themselves." So stop punishing yourself, he was saying.

To turn the tables, not that there has been much evidence of a young versus old divisiveness in New Zealand society, Mr Potter offered his version of a one-liner to wipe the smirk off young people's faces: "Keep up" -- as in going one better on self-proclaimed sophisticates.

Now *that* will make them feel behind the curve, he suggested. Latest smartphone from Apple/Samsung that young people lust after? His rejoinder: "After Alexander Graham Bell, all that came after were dumb phones because Bell's was the first phone that worked." Electric scooters ridden by young fiends that are knocking old people off footpaths? A suffragette in flowing costume was riding one (perhaps mechanically enabled?) in 1916, it was claimed. Mr Potter brandished what appeared to be photographic evidence.

The last act of showmanship had tease written all over it. Mr Potter inveigled audience members to say to themselves: "I am still doing it." A titter ran through the hall this time. It could have been a hiss, but the senior folk of Howick were nothing if not charitable.
