President's Report - 2021 AGM

This past year has been a very difficult year for all of us due to the extraordinary event of Covid and the restrictions placed upon us. These restrictions resulted in my official Presidency beginning in July 2020 and since then we have been able to enjoy 5 Monthly Meetings. I regret being unable to contribute as much as I would have liked to our Organisation, and also regret not being able to get to know more of you individually. Our Group Meetings have also been curtailed although some groups did communicate on occasion by Zoom. Perhaps we have become a little more 'technically savvy' because of these restrictions.

April Speaker: Guy Slocum



Guy's talk was most interesting, and we were lucky to have had the opportunity to hear such an interesting speaker, who has led such an exciting life.

Guy began his career in the cold war, flying on spying missions for the British Government. At the end of World War 2, Europe was divided, it was the dawn of the nuclear age, and there was suspicion and fear on both sides of the East-West divide. The Russians had missiles lined up under

the sea and in the air with the ability to launch missiles 450 miles away and Guy's job was to intercept and destroy these missiles. In those days, young men were paid to get their pilot's licences, and Guy was awarded a flying scholarship. On his 17th birthday, he passed a test to join the air force to fly a war bird. It took him 140 flying-hours to learn basic skills and get his wings, and he then went on to be a fighter pilot.

As time went by, he learnt to fly more and more sophisticated planes. In 1966, he was one of five out of thirty trainees who passed the tests to become a fighter pilot. He then went to fighter school to learn to use craft as a weapon. He started by using gunnery training bullets tipped with paint where he shot at targets on the ground or at banners in the sky to prove a score for each plane. After 6 months training he joined his first squadron in a plane designed to intercept Russian bombers. On one occasion, his plane caught fire and he ditched the aircraft into the North Sea. To get to the Finnish border where the Russians kept their planes he had to spend 6 to 7 hours in the air. They had to refuel from flying tankers which required great skill. These missions were secret and no one would admit pilots were flying until later were asked to take photos of enemy planes for information. On one occasion, he flew close to a man in Russian plane who did not attack him but held up a playboy magazine! Later he spent two years for the Royal Navy, flying from warships' decks. The wing had to be at right angle to get off the deck and landing was also tricky. Later he flew a sea-harrier plane which was capable of vertical take-off. It could change the nozzle angle to fly normally or vertically.

During his flying career, he had several accidents or "emergencies". During his early training on the Scottish borders, he experienced his first emergency. His wooden propeller splintered and his engine seized. He landed in a field of cows, much to the displeasure of an irate farmer. Later, in a supersonic plane, his undercarriage, which was used to brake the plane, wouldn't open properly and he landed on doors instead of wheels. In a third emergency, his engine failed in Germany. He ejected and the plane caught on fire, which lifted his parachute into the air and into some trees.

Finally, he retired from the excitement and danger of active flying and went to "command ops" where he worked from behind a desk.

May Speaker:



Mick Clout is an Emeritus Professor at the University of Auckland and has broad interests in the applications of ecological science to conservation. Originally from the UK (where he studied Ecological Science at the University of Edinburgh), Mick gained his PhD from the University of Auckland in 1977, studying the ecology of brushtail possums. He then commenced his science career with DSIR Ecology Division at Nelson, from 1977-1989. In 1989 he joined the NZ Department of Conservation as Research Manager, where he also acted as Director of Protected Species. In 1993 Mick became an academic at the University of Auckland and extended his research interests into areas of biosecurity and invasive species

management. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of New Zealand (RSNZ) and was awarded the 2007 Sir Peter Scott Medal for Conservation Merit, the 2008 RSNZ Charles Fleming Award for Environmental Achievement and the 2014 Marsden Medal. Mick was the founding Chair of the Invasive Species Specialist Group of IUCN (which he led from 1995-2008), the Chair of the NZ Biosecurity Ministerial Advisory Committee from 2005-2013, and was a member of the NZ Conservation Authority from 2011-2020. He has chaired the Kakapo Recovery Group for the past 25 years.
