OUR OCTOBER SPEAKER will be Iain Wakefield

Iain was born in Edinburgh. He attended school in London where he developed his initial love of history. After medical school in London, he worked in Leeds, Edinburgh, Guernsey and Brisbane before settling in New Zealand in 1990. He has held academic positions at the University of Auckland. He worked as a single-handed family doctor in Drury for 22 years before retirement. He called himself 'The Jolly Doctor', and was situated opposite 'The Jolly Farmer'. He has been a member of the Papakura District Historical Society for 29 years. In that time, he has given three talks to the Society and written five articles for 'Sentinel'. He won the national excellence award of the NZ Military History Society in 2007 for a paper on Reverend Thomas Norrie. In retirement, he is assisting Curator Alan in the preparation of the up-coming exhibition on the story of Ring's Redoubt outside Papakura.

This afternoon's talk will tell the story of his house in Drury, the oldest in the area and a rather significant building over the last 167 years.

OUR SEPTEMBER SPEAKER was PROFESSOR JULIAN PATON Pat James introduced Julian

Julian spoke of how the nervous system regulates the cardiovascular and respiratory systems in health and disease. His work has generated numerous patents and led to clinical trials in patients with heart disease. He is Director of a new heart centre (Manaaki Mānawa) combining experts in the University of Auckland and district health boards. He is Co-Director of the recently awarded national Centre of Research Excellence in Heart Health across New Zealand. His talk was fascinating, informative, and easy to follow, plus loads of practical advice for all. Star of the North by D.B. John Star of the North opens in 1998 when a Korean American teenager is captured from a South Korean beach by North Korean operatives. Twelve years later, her brilliant twin sister, Jenn, is still searching for her. The story line follows 3 threads. The second is Mrs Moon and the third is the story of a high-ranking North Korean official who discovers that he may be descended from a traitor. These three-story lines gradually converge and lead to an unforgettable climax. RATED: 5

The Shadow Sister by Lucinda Riley This is the third book in the Seven Sisters series. Star is the silent sister who must find her voice. Enigmatic and hesitant to step out of the safety of the close relationship she shares with her sister Cece. Her story begins a hundred years earlier in Edwardian England and involves Royal scandals and Beatrix Potter.

The Changeover by Margaret Mahy. Sitting in a room with 10 trumpet players having a Master Class, our reader was happy to find a book shelf and this amazing book by Margaret Mahy. It was written in 1984 and is a supernatural romance novel for young adults. Set in Christchurch, it concerns Laura Chant who tries to break a mysterious curse on her brother, Jacko. This involves Laura going through a dangerous changeover to become a witch. Fantastic book and highly recommended.

LILY REESE AND BOER CAMPS



Lily was one of the 20 New Zealand women selected to work as teachers for the Boer children living in concentration camps in South Africa.

Her father, William Lee Rees, was a prominent lawyer and Liberal politician, while her sister Rosemary became a well-known actress, novelist and theatre producer.



Te Rauparaha? –**1849** Ngāti Toa leader His biography, written by Steven Oliver, was first published in the Dictionary of New Zealand Biography in 1990. It was translated into te reo Māori by the Dictionary of New Zealand Biography team.

Born: 1768, <u>Kawhia Harbour</u> **Died:** 27 November 1849, <u>Ōtaki</u> **Children:** Tāmihana Te Rauparaha **Siblings:** Nohorua, Waitohi

Battles/wars: Musket Wars; Wairau Affray

Buried: Rangiātea Church, Ōtaki, probably reinterred on Kapiti Island

Te Rauparaha was a Māori rangatira of the Ngāti Toa tribe who took a leading part in the Musket Wars and trade with Europeans, receiving the nickname "the Napoleon of the South". He participated in land sale and negotiations with the New Zealand Company at the beginning of the colonisation of New Zealand. He also had 200 personal slaves.



The *Lion Monument* (German: Löwendenkmal), or the *Lion of Lucerne*, is a rock relief in Lucerne, Switzerland, designed by Bertel Thorvaldsen and hewn in 1820–21 by Lukas Ahorn. It commemorates the Swiss Guards who were massacred in 1792 during the French Revolution, when revolutionaries stormed the Tuileries Palace in Paris. It is one of the most famous monuments in Switzerland, visited annually by about 1.4 million tourists. In 2006, it was placed under Swiss monument protection.

US author Mark Twain praised the sculpture of a mortally wounded lion as "the most mournful and moving piece of stone in the world." | 13|
