OUR JUNE SPEAKER WILL BE GUY SLOCUM

Guy was born in London in the shadow of the Wembley sports stadium. He developed an early passion for flying which he indulged by joining the Air Cadets and obtaining his glider pilot's license one week after his sixteenth birthday. The award of a government flying scholarship allowed him to gain his private pilot's license (PPL), at no cost, the month after he turned 17. From the PPL airfield he went straight into the Royal Air Force where he trained as a fast jet fighter pilot chasing Soviet aircraft around the Iceland/Faeroes gap.

After 12 years he retired from flying and joined an international investment institution in London.

He will be talking to us about his experience during the Falklands conflict in the South Atlantic

BOOK REVIEW May 2023

4 Present with 6 apologies

Troubled Blood by Robert Galbraith: This is the fifth Strike novel about criminal cases solved by Cormoron Strike, an ex-military policeman and his female partner.

The detective agency is asked to investigate a 40 year old missing person case by the missing person's daughter. This is a complicated investigation and our reader felt that there was much unnecessary detail which delayed the story. He also noted that each novel increases in length and at 927 pages, some editing and simplifying would have helped.

Rated: 3

The Little Wartime Library by Kate Thompson: This book is based on true events and is set in London in 1944. Clara is no ordinary librarian; while the world remains at war, Clara creates the country's only underground library built over the tracks of the discussed Bethnal Green Tube Station. A whole community thrives with thousands of bunk beds, a nursery, a café and a theatre giving solace and an escape from the bombs.

Rated: 4

Broken is Beautiful by Jane Shearer: this story is set in Christchurch during the Covid years. The years of the earthquakes are still very real and many people are suffering mental health problems. One of these is Julia who has a troubled background which has led to an obsessive habit; she has become a hoarder. Julia befriends a homeless man and offers him shelter in her home. He manages to get her to agree to see a therapist. Covid arrives and the author uses this as a platform to discuss the pros and cons of how New Zealand deals with the virus and the story becomes more non-fiction. Our reader felt that the story dragged and wasn't sure what it was meant to portray.

Rated: 3

The Son-in Law by Charity Norman: How do you ever forgive the unforgiveable? This is the thought-provoking subject matter of this book which is a gripping, heart-breaking family drama. Joseph Scott has just left prison after serving a 3 year sentence for manslaughter. The victim was his wife, Zoe. Their 3 young children witnessed her traumatic death and have been living with their grandparents ever since. Joseph desperately wants to reunite with them. This is a powerfully told story of love, forgiveness and family which the reader really enjoyed.

Rated: 5
