MURU- An art exhibition

Muru is a statement of restitution and reciprocity. It describes the Maori cultural practice of restoring justice and balance when actions have brought about harm or disrepute. Four artists have contributed to the mural on the wall in the Papakura Library foyer. In addition these local artists have an exhibition in the Papakura Art Gallery at 10 Averill Street. Open Wed- Fri 10 - 4 and Sat 10-2. Closes 29 July.

Last meeting: Out 'n' About June visit to the Takaani library.

Ten of us visited this modern library. Jamie-Lee and Eden explained that before it was built there was considerable community consultation. As a result it is a community hub in addition to its function as a library. Emphasis has been placed on making all feel welcome so on arrival the first thing one sees is a kitchen where food can be prepare, cooked and eaten without asking permission from the staff. The side rooms all have moveable walls so the space can be changed to meet the needs of those using them. When we visited a group was having a workshop on learning computer skills in one of the side rooms. Te reo classes are held regularly and the everyday use of te reo is encouraged. Children are made to feel welcome with a slide, table tennis table and football table. There is also a parents' room with facilities to heat bottles and changing tables.

There are many amazing features. Returned books are placed upright on shelves which have the ability to read bar codes! This seems preferable to pushing them through a slot as one does in Papakura. The books themselves are placed on the shelves by author's name with little categorisation. The book shelves are lower than usual so there are good sight lines throughout. They are on casters so they too are moveable. Although the floor space is limited,

high ceilings and the extensive use of glass makes the whole area seem filled with light and very welcoming.

Thank you Margaret Gane for organising this visit. If you haven't visited yet, I recommend that you call in and see this modern library and community hub next time you are in Takaanini.
