Last meeting: Thank you Sue for opening your home -the eight of us enjoyed each other's company. Thanks also to those who provided snacks for our morning tea. Those who were unable to attend, we missed you. Snippets of Memoirs from our meeting today.

Hearing of a Narrow boat holiday, that was meant to be. Of travelling on the waterways, and stopping whenever they chose, of visiting the villages and pubs along the way. Lesson - don't give up dreaming: it can/will happen.

Then of the first trip to Darwin, Australia, and many adventures with friends. One was of all sitting around outside in a circle, by the BBQ, with platters of cooked prawns on the menu. Special times. Of hitch hiking, safety in groups and friendly folk to help them.

Of a young girl having brothers but NO pets. This was "Work in Progress" and many lost, sick or stray animals (and insects) were brought home and of finally being able to have a chicken, whose egg was tendered and kept warm in bed. Shame the end of this cracking story did not result in a baby chick.

Then a little girl under 6 who cut her own hair while sitting in front of the open fire, unbeknown to her parents who were there too. At age 7-8 of 3 cousins staying with their Grandad and his new wife and being treated to a display of Christmas Trees from around the world, and then a Pantomime in Lower Hutt and Wellington.

Flying off then to Australia on a Business trip, and taking their two young children along, too. Visiting a safari park, and her husband was having his birthday and was serenaded by a pack of

sealions honking out "Happy Birthday" to him. Children were thrilled at this and were having a lovely time with many memories made there.

When arriving in England during winter, after Sunny NZ, the weather was dark and dismal, but then a few months later spring arrived there. The joy of seeing plants sprouting, flower buds forming and the SUN...and of visiting new places with new friends and a new job.

Another push bike story of Mother with one daughter sitting on the frame over the back wheel, of being dropped off in town and Mother returning home to collect the other daughter and doing the shopping. There was Friday late-night shopping too at Woolworths and McKenzie's variety shops, with very long counters with the shop attendants walking along these lanes. Adding up purchases in their heads - no checkout counters by the exits or mechanical tills.

How things have changed since the War: food for one. England and tea drinking, coffee and cafes not around then, but when REAL coffee arrived, lots enjoyed this drink and were out in cafes and restaurants. Cheeses changed too - many flavours and varieties. Of phoning your grocery order to the local corner store and the goods being delivered by a lad on a bike with a huge wicker basket over the front wheel. Of the contraptions for payment - one being an overhead pulley system of cylinders that went along and ended up into the office, returning with change to the assistant below.



One was a mechanical system, in which gravity helped propel the cash-containing pods along wires; the other was a pneumatic system in which a blast of compressed air or suck from a vacuum had the pods in motion.
