Dr James Cleland spoke about Motor Neuron Disease (MND). MND is one of about 700 neurological conditions.

Motor Neuron Disease affects about 1 in 15,000 people.

It is a fatal progressive disease causing weakness, muscle wasting and leads to loss of life on average three years after onset of symptoms.

For most people it does not affect their cognitive ability.

It can affect any age but most common age of onset is 50-70 yr old group.

It is not contagious. It is not painful. The cause is not genetic in most cases.

People with MND face physical challenges with every day living, the feeling of being a burden to others, the worry about their future.

Research is being done in NZ as part of an international study using a two year trial of Antiviral medication— Triumeq.

Ivan Judd from Hato Hone St John spoke about Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (**CPR**) and the use of the Automatic External Defibrillator (**AED**) at our last meeting

Every day five people have a cardiac arrest in the home so it is important that you know how to initiate help. It can happen suddenly and without warning.



What's your first response? Immediately!

- Phone 111 Ambulance
- **Do CPR until help arrives** 30 chest compressions then two breaths to the mouth with the neck extended (100 compressions per minute) and repeat.
- Use Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) if possible. An AED increases a persons survival rate by 44%

'Thirty to two, no matter who'
That means thirty chest compressions to two breaths

Burial Rites by Hannah Kent.

Burial rites is based on actual events and is one of my favourite reads. It has won five awards.

It is set in the harsh landscape of Iceland in 1829 and is the story of Agnes, condemned to death for murder and the last woman in Iceland to be executed.


The author on a study trip to Iceland came across Agnes' story and researched her actual trial and existence until her execution.

Agnes has to spend the winter with a peasant farm family while awaiting execution in the Spring when the ground will have begun to thaw enough for her burial.

During this time her story of love and betrayal is revealed.

The prose is magic, toughes you, holds you and as one reviewer said 'Agnes will stay with you long after the last page has been turned' - it did with me.

The descriptions of surviving every day in freezing harsh conditions are vivid from sheepskins for windows to a relative who has died, being kept in the storeroom, which is a natural freezer with the winter's supply of mutton.



It is a beautifully written, gripping saga to the long count down to Spring. A deeply moving novel. Being a 'Book Club' book, Burial Rites had to be posted back once read.

Later, on seeing this book in a second hand shop I bought it as I thought to own this book would be great.

Punch and Judy- Traditional puppet show


Punchinello- Italian short fat clown puppet

Last month the Garden Group was able to visit **Titoki Healing Centre**.

For those who are new to the area Titoki Healing Centre is a 10 acre property that was established as an interdemoninational retreat in Poroporo by the Rev Ferguson family in 1976.

It is called Titoki because not only is it on Titoki Rd but it has a large Titoki tree in the front of the property. As well as that, the healing properties of the Titoki tree were well known to the Māoris who used the berries and the leaves.

The Retreat used to have nurses on site to care for

patients post hospitalization. Today, Titoki runs retreats, courses, and offers accomodation to returning missionaries and to others needing a quiet restful time. Their main focus is to be a retreat. It is a place for both Christians and non Christians to find peace and rest.

Other buildings have been added to the property over the years and staff and guests can enjoy living in park like surroundings with its own wee chapel.

There are some serving opportunities available at Titoki. At present their volunteer numbers are quite low but if you have some time to help there is always work available – painting, gardening, pruning, preserving, being a helper in the kitchen or even a spot of cleaning.

Recently I came across a pianist that I had not known about previously— a UK based musician—Nicolas Mc Carthy

Nicolas is a concert pianist and has travelled extensively world wide but what makes this man so amazing is that he is the only 'concert pianist' with one arm.

He tells the story when as a teenager he wanted to get into one of the Music schools in London but while trying to arrange for an audition with the Head Mistress he disclosed that he only had one arm and she hung the phone up on him. Undaunted, he contacted The Guildhall Music School and was granted an interview (not disclosing that he was born without a right hand this time)

In 2012 Nicholas became the first 'one handed' graduate of the Royal College of Music in London in its 130 year history.




