Warmest Greetings Everyone

We are very fortunate to have a new volunteer, Jill van Angeren, taking up the mantle of Secretary but still need a volunteer to fill the role of Treasurer. Marilyn is able to continue until December and is very happy to assist whoever answers the call to take up this position. The rest of your committee members have again volunteered their time along with one new recruit, Sarah Gunningham, and I know they will continue to give sterling service to you. My thanks go to all who assist with the smooth running of our highly successful society – what a wonderful group of people we have. I would also like to thank our members for their confidence in re-electing me as President for another year.



I recently enjoyed a week in the Northland on a short tour up the west coast as far as Cape Reinga and then back to Auckland down the east coast. Only 13 in our tour group and a lovely bunch of people to share the journey with.

It was so refreshing to see the green fields and hills and so many areas of native forest cladding the hills and in the paddocks. We visited the amazing Kauri Museum at Matakohe, then journeyed on to Opononi where we received a beautiful welcome

at our hotel from local Māori young people. While there we took a fascinating walk in a Kauri forest, followed by a visit to "Manea – Footprints of Kupe" – an amazing presentation which included feeling the spray of the ocean on our faces and the sensation of octopus tentacles and seaweed round our legs as part of the story!

Moving on we then travelled through Rawene where we visited Clendon House and then crossed by ferry across the Hokianga harbour to continue onwards to Doubtless Bay where we stayed for two nights. The next day we joined another tour bus for the trip to Cape Reinga and Ninety Mile Beach. The walk down to the lighthouse was on a long, well-made path which unfortunately provided us with a very steep climb back up to the bus. Lots of huffing and puffing was experienced!

Off again, we next travelled to Kerikeri, where we checked out the Stone store, New Zealand's oldest surviving commercial building, and Kemp house which was built in 1821-1822. We finished that day's travelling in Russell where we stayed in the Duke of Marlborough Hotel. Early in the morning three of us took up the option of a Hole in the Rock Dolphin cruise – neither of which we actually saw! The weather decided to disrupt the sea making it unsafe to venture out to the Hole in the Rock so we cruised round the islands instead, went ashore in a lovely bay for lunch (the weather had cleared up then of course). From there we went to the Waitangi Treaty House and grounds where we were given a guided tour and finished the day in Paihia with a delightful meal beside the harbour.

Our final tourist stop was in Whangarei where we had another guided tour around the Hundertwasser Art Centre (only finished two years ago), a most interesting place to spend time. Leaving there we returned to the Auckland Airport where the group dispersed to their various home towns, a happy group with new friends made.

Finally, may I please remind you that if you sign up for one of our courses and you find you are then unable to attend on the agreed day and time, you must let your Group Convener know so anyone of the waiting list can be offered your place. Also please let your host know if you are unable to attend any of the sessions – they go to a lot of trouble setting up for the group and it is most disappointing when after all their preparations people simply don't turn up!

2024 has been a very exciting year for this Courses' Organiser. The Great Courses where we buy all our DVD Courses has been having huge sales as they are getting rid of most of their current courses so they can make room for new ones.

The Great Courses website is a wonderful resource as we are provided with knowledge, understanding and experiences of countries, history, science, people and the future. Because the prices of courses have dropped to as low as \$10-\$30 (US) we have been able to purchase many more of them than in previous years. So, this financial year I have bought 15 new courses! Most of them are currently being shown but I still have five to introduce next year. These are The Wisdom of History, Polar Explorations, The Great Tours: Experiencing Medieval Europe, African American History, and the History and Archaeology of the Bible. Maya To Aztec - Ancient Mesoamerica Revealed

This course is a tale of two great cultures, together with many others in between.

Mesoamerica is all of Mexico from coast to coast and some of Guatemala.

The advances in science, technology and art in Mesoamerica is far greater than most people realize and was well ahead of other cultures.

Coffee and bananas were first grown in the area and the Mayans built pyramids before the Egyptians. The stone carvings are amazing. Gold was mined.

The Mayans lasted for 4,000 years from 2000 BC. The Aztecs for 300 years.

The Mayans created a system of letters and numbers, sports stadiums, the 60 second/minutes which we use in time today.

Your mind will be stretched and your brain stimulated by all the information in this course.

The presenter is enthusiastic and knows the subject inside out.

The Iliad and Homer's Odyssey

Professor Vandiver makes it vividly clear why, after almost 3,000 years, the *Iliad and Homer's Odyssey* remain not only among the greatest adventure stories ever told, but also most compelling meditations on the human condition ever written.

This strangeness and distance throw sharply into focus the timeless human issues that encompass the Trojan War and Odysseus's subsequent journey, fighting wars, voyaging to strange lands on the shores of winedark seas, dealing face-to-face with gods and monsters. The two DVD Courses are beautifully narrated with knowledge, humour and clarity. We thoroughly enjoyed the Iliad and have almost completed The Odyssey. **Ann Moore**

The Barbarians of the Steppes

Dr Harl presents a course that puts the Steppes in the centre of Eurasian History. Attila the Hun and Genghis Khan loom large as two of history's most fearsome warrior-leaders. Accounts of the ruthless conquests of these men called "The Scourge of God" and "Universal Lord" both fascinate and repel. Yet few people today are aware of their place in causing campaigns of terror to sweep across the Eurasian steppes, toppling empires and seizing control of civilizations which still reverberate today – e.g.; the fall of the Rowman Empire; the start of Buddhism and Islam; The Great wall of China; the spread of the Russian Empire.

It is a very through and fascinating course outlining history explained by a man who really knows and understands ancient history.

Charles Riley recommends this course.

The American Civil War

Ken Burns brought to life America's most destructive and defining conflict. It is a film full of digitally enhanced images mostly ordinary young men fighting for their beliefs. It is a comprehensive and definitive history of the American Civil War, and in 1990 was the recipient of 40 major film and television awards, including two Emmys and two Grammys. It is harrowing and also addictive to watch! Thoroughly recommended!

The Great Tours - From Athens to Istanbul

This is probably the 3rd or even 4th time this course has run. The 7 participants in the current course all agree that it is thoroughly enjoyable and one of the best. Even if you know the Aegean area, the history and information imparted by the lecturer Professor John R. Hale, a renowned archeologist, will increase your knowledge and understanding of the world we live in today.

Almost everywhere you look you will find archaeological wonders – more of the history has been preserved than perhaps any place on earth. To travel through the Aegean is to travel through the history of Western civilization. Homer composed his poetry along the shores, Hippocrates made the West's first systematic medical observations.

Istanbul – formerly Constantinople – stands at the crossroads of East and West. The Blue Mosque and Hagia Sophia are 2 outstanding places to visit. Istanbul is now and always has been, a melting pot of cultures. Professor Hale gives numerous traveler tips like must visit places, taking water with you and wearing a hat! The current course will be completed in January.
