Armchair Travel is organised and ready to start. We have obtained another spot at the Marlborough Library for this meeting and it is full at present.



Ancient Writing and the History of the Alphabet – summary so far

The course is narrated by John McWhorter, he is a very entertaining lecturer and easy to understand making the course very good to listen to. We have only listened to the first 6 courses. We started with the basic history of writing and its origins around 5,500 years ago, then moved on to Cuneiform script which is nothing like what we would understand today.

Next was Egyptian Hieroglyphs that we would all recognise from the Pyramids & Tombs in Egypt, but translating these symbols to understand what they meant was a different matter and took the finding of "The Rosetta Stone" in 1799 to sort it out. Then the "Alphabet" moved around East Asia before we discover where the letters A, E & O came from.

So, it is a very worthwhile course which we are all enjoying and is fairly short at only 16 lectures. **Paul Gunningham**

Can You Help?


The following guidelines are designed to assist members who kindly volunteer to convene our Study Groups:


