First Speaker Jessica Eyers, 'The benefits of a Passive House'

Main Speaker Robert Aitken, 'Consumers, Consumption and Caveats'

Speaker Profiles

Jessica Eyers, Sustainable Building Consultant and Architectural Designer, will explain what a Passive House is and the benefits for occupants and the environment.

Jessica has a master's degree in Environmental Architecture and is a Certified Passive House Designer. She and her husband completed the first strawbale certified Passive House outside of Europe. She is currently working on the first certified 'Passive Build' community building in Aotearoa - the new Luggate Community Centre.

Associate Professor Robert Aitken, Head of the Department of Marketing, University of Otago. He teaches consumer behaviour, advertising, branding, communications and media-related marketing issues. Currently his research focuses on two major areas: marketing to children and marketing in relation to sustainability and consumption.

Robert is also active in the community, with connections to Age Concern and Consumer. He was recently elected president of the Australia and New Zealand Marketing Academy.

October's Speakers

Gorilla Encounter. Mike Elliot recounted his and Liz's four-day visit to Uganda. Having taken a flight from Entebbe in an 8-seater plane, a 4x4 drive, then a steep walk with guides, they were lucky enough to observe at close quarters families of gorillas in their natural forest habitat. The animals were not at all shy - the young ones were playing; the adult males were impressively large and muscular. There is a move to educate the local people to appreciate the gorillas and the benefits derived from visiting tourists.



At the end of his address Mike presented our President with a gavel and sound-board that he personally crafted from the wood of a 100-year old yew tree felled at Fork Farm, the Hunt family farm at Maungawera. In expressing his appreciation, Allan agreed that this must be passed on to successive Presidents of the Mt Aspiring U3A for their continuing use.

Does International Aid Work? In a most moving address, Cassandra Treadwell outlined the background to her setting up, twelve years ago, 'So They Can' - an organisation that aims to provide quality education to children living in poverty in East Africa. Since then money has been raised, schools built, local teachers trained, and goals met and refined. While education is core, emphasis is placed on the wellbeing of children, the empowerment of women, and community health and development - all within conditions laid down by local authorities.

On one of her trips to Kenya Cassandra visited a refuse site where orphaned children try to eke out a life while competing with pigs and vultures. Equally harrowing were stories of girls as young as nine being sold by their families as brides, enduring multiple pregnancies and being afforded no human rights: some of those who run away are supported as much as possible by So They Can. Education is seen as the only way to break the cycle: for the girls it offers a better life, for the families the knowledge that by working the girls can provide them with ongoing support.

Covid-19 has affected the programme and additional measures have been introduced to protect the students.

Our meetings will look at the development of Wanaka, Albert Town, Hawea, Luggate, Makarora, Cardrona, Matukituki and




Tarras, as well as some early Maori history and explorers.

Our "Whisky Appreciation Group"

Allen Hogan and I have found 15 discerning, curious and otherwise thirsty members to meet somewhat erratically since February but to explore the facts and myths surrounding whisky. Some might suggest that the phenolic, disinfectant and medicinal properties of

"Laphroaig" have been superior to Trump's alternative of bleach and has kept us Corona-virus free over the "Lock-down" and winter.

We have studied the ingredients, barley, water (hard or soft), yeast and the mysteries of peat; the centuries-long tales of illicit stills and whisky smuggling; the interventions of the exciseman; the regulated production of malt whisky in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland, and the approval given by Royalty. We have listened to the rise of powerful whisky Barons such as John (Johnnie) Walker, The Dewars, James Buchanan, the Haigs and Peter Mackie, and how blended whisky replaced brandy in the drawing rooms of the Victorians. We plotted their rise, and falls, the impact of war and taxes, of Temperance campaigns and American Prohibition. We visited Ireland, conducted by one of our group thoroughly versed in the ways of the Irish, of their potheen and their whiskey. Another member took us to post-Revolution (18th and not 21st Century) America with its Kentucky bourbon (Woodford Reserve, or alternatively, try Jim Beam) and the Tennessee Sour Mash eq Jack Daniels.

We are currently touring the Scottish Islands. We started with Islay and next week visit Arran and Jura; Skye and Orkney to follow before returning to firm ground at Campbelltown and descending to the Lowlands.
