Emeritus Professor Russell Bishop

'Teaching to the North-East: a reflection on a career in Maori Education'



Dr Bishop began teaching in 1973 at a secondary school in a newly developed commuter city adjacent to Wellington. He was surprised to find that most of the indigenous Maori and Pacific Island children scored consistently lower on standardised achievement tests across all age ranges than the Pakeha children. The students told him of their toxic in-class relationships; and that this pattern of negative interactions had been the case in their families for generations.

"These experiences set me off on a course of research and practice that was to take over my life leading me to explore my own ancestry, question my own educational practices and enter into a long-term academic career where I sought to address the issues associated with educational disparities and attempt to develop a means of addressing these problems."

Last Month's Speakers Karyn Munro, 'Why Gender Inclusive?'



Karyn was born in Mataura in Southland, lived in Masterton and Greymouth and has been 28 years in Wanaka, now working with the newly formed suicide prevention group for the QLDC. Back in her day, nobody identified as gender diverse, and it was through her friend Glen in the USA opening up about his sexual past that Karyn became aware and then studied for a Bachelor of Gay Studies in 1992. Even at that time only a small percentage of the population

identified as straight homosexual or lesbian.

As a single mother, Karyn was very protective when people said her only son Leo was gay. Leo, a very creative person, is now in his 3rd year of a degree in performing arts. About the time he came out, the Sex and Gender Awareness Group (SAGA) was formed in Wanaka. There has been a changing landscape in awareness over the last five years, identifying anxiety and mood with high statistics of suicides. Terminology has become more specific: gender dysphoria is dissatisfaction with, transgender - does not align with, and non-binary - gender variant, LGBTAQIA plus. These days medical treatment and care is better tailored to the individual's specific needs.

Karyn recommended that we watch the TVNZ documentary "This Is Us", the students' statement of what they want us to know and (as a mark of respect) enabling the conversations to be led by them.

Tony Glynn 'Issues facing the farming community'

Tony entertained us with an address that, while being light on some detail relating to the farming community, was full of humour. He had enjoyed a great upbringing in Eastern Bush, Tuatapere, with dogs, guns, bulldozers, broken machinery and hunting. His love of horses

led to his employment in Japan working with thoroughbreds. He described this as easy work, but very regimented and all under cover, not a natural environment for the horses. He then worked and got to travel around the world with the Dutch polo team.




Tony now lives with his partner Debs on a block south of Luggate where they run a few sheep.

Having established the company 'Rural TV', he travels around New Zealand filming stud stock for the farmers, in order to promote them prior to the sales. He is also involved with A&P Shows around the country and was impressed with the rise in stock numbers at this year's Wanaka A&P Show, that is run by an amazing team. In response to a question from the floor, he recommended the Rural Health Trust, while being short of funding, offers support to farmers and is raising awareness of mental health problems.
