Scam of the month.... By Chuck Rademacher

I'm being bombarded with so many scams lately, that it's difficult to select our first scam of the month. So, I'll tell you about the one that irritates me the most.

This scam can show up in an email, but more often you will just see it as a pop-up ad in your browser. There are a lot of variations involved, so I will create a composite to describe it.

Firstly, it uses images and supposed interviews with local and international celebrities such as Mike Hosking, Clark Gayford, Suzie Aiken, Simon Barnett, Hilary Barry, John Campbell and others.

The typical scam goes something like this (using John Campbell as an example).

John is being interviewed and supposedly the "government" has shut down the interview because what John is talking about could destroy the entire NZ tax structure. John is making so much money trading bitcoins that he will be able to quit working. Supposedly, the government is preventing John from telling too many people about this because nobody will be paying taxes in the future.

The scam is asking you to pay \$495 to enable you to trade bitcoins, which is totally unnecessary. You WILL lose the \$495. More importantly, the scammer has your credit card details and you will lose a lot more.

As the sergeant on Hill Street Blues use to say.... Be careful out there!!

U3A Annual Regional Gathering 27 July 2024

Doreen Hogan attended the July event held by the U3A Auckland regional network, alongside members from all over Auckland.

Here is her report:

Did you know that, as Aucklanders, we are living in the fourth most diverse city in the world (defined by percentage of population born overseas : 43%), ahead of Sydney, London, Melbourne (35 - 38%), L.A., New York (23 - 27%) ? Or that our city footprint is comparable to that of London?

These are some of the myriad of facts and figures given by Paul Spoonley at the Regional U3A Network Gathering in July. Along with Sir Ashley Bloomfield (who needs no introduction), Paul Spoonley was a keynote speaker at that gathering. A Professor Emeritus at Massey University at Palmerston North, Paul's specialist area is Social Change and Demography, and how this impacts policy decisions at the political level.

He told us that our city is super-sized and super-diverse and will continue to be so. By the 2030's, 75% of Aotearoa's population will live in the top half of the North Island, with 40% in Auckland. Auckland will see 50-60% of the future growth of NZ's population. This growth is being driven by immigration, not birthrate. Auckland is really a different city to the rest of NZ!

Paul Spoonley would "dearly love" for NZ to develop a location policy – and do planning to deal with all this growth. He has written lots of papers for Government but got nowhere! He blames the three year electoral cycle.

Sir Ashley Bloomfield spoke on: "Public Trust in Aotearoa NZ: where are we at and how do we strengthen public trust to build social capital and social cohesion?" Trust has two dimensions - between people and in institutions (Govt, private sector, civil society, media). For example in the 1st Covid lockdown New Zealanders showed a high level of both dimensions of trust.

He discussed current trust levels as shown in respected international surveys, and mentioned factors influencing trust.

Business scored higher than Government; journalists less so (a matter of concern, as journalists are the Fourth Estate, an important part of the balance of power in a healthy democracy). Teachers, scientists, neighbours also ranked highly. Sir Ashley suggested that governments do better to tell the people what they (govt) don't know, explain why when changes occur, and be upfront about mistakes and remedies. Journalists catastrophise too much! No institution is trusted to integrate technological innovation into society.

On Sir Ashley Bloomfield's wish list: Government Cross-Party Consensus - a must to move forward!

Slipped in between the main speakers, like 'little sweet treats', were four mini-

speakers who were volunteers from various local U3As. They gave us food for thought on :

- Time (as in geological time revealed in rock formations)
- Refugee Journey (NZ's settlement programme and the difficulties it helps refugees overcome)
- Adoption (Laws past and present and the profound effects they have had on people's lives)
- Girton College Women's College at Cambridge (Speaker wove together her recent Summer School experience there, with the history of the College and of women's access to University education and Degree status)

I must also mention the pleasant setting, smooth organisation, satisfying individual lunch boxes and lots of conversation ... altogether, a very enjoyable and stimulating Saturday!




KING'S BIRTHDAY HONOUR
